A Liturgy of Love is designed to offer parents easy access to a flavoursome menu of the delectable Charlotte Mason-inspired (CM) feast of education.

Prepared as a self-contained, pick-up and go resource, our curriculum offers busy yet intentional parents a breadth of wholesome, diverse and meaningful education to enrich the hearts and minds of their children in one sitting.

Considering the short attention of young children and the Charlotte Mason principle of keeping lessons short, we have kept each piece in our resource menu short and sweet (age appropriately) for busy parents to complete within 30mins-1hr depending on age.

The short timeframe makes this resource highly suitable for both full-time home educators and those who work outside the home.

Whilst our resource pack is fully comprehensive in its offering, we recognize that as Morning Time is essentially about focusing on what matters to families, we have left the sections on stories and living books for parents to make their own choices. We have dedicated section 4 of this resource to several lists of suggested books and resources for you to choose from.

Art and Music Appreciation

Charlotte Mason Approach to Picture or Music Study



When to do Picture Study?

Picture/Art study can be done any time to fit with your family's schedule. I prefer to do it once a week as part of CM Morning Time activities. I have also done picture and music study successfully immediately after dinner in the evening.

How to do Picture Study with CM Approach?

In this EYS or pre-school morning time resource, it is proposed that the child (ren) only study 3 pieces of art by the same artist each term. In line with Ms Mason's principles, we recommend that you introduce your child(ren) to the artist through an age appropriate living book or a lively biography to help the child become familiar with the life , culture and context of the artist.

"We cannot measure the influence that one or another artist has upon the child's sense of beauty, upon his power of seeing, as in a picture, the common sights of life; he is enriched more than we know in having really looked at even a single picture. 1. **Print or photocopy** an A4 size copy of this month's designated picture. This summer term will be studying a few of Claude Monet's well-loved summer themed works of art. See section 3 of the Morning Time Menu. You can either download or photocopy this picture from any of the art resources suggested in the art and music appreciation resource page which you will find in Section 4 of this resource.

Display the selected art on an easel, a bookstand or anywhere your child(ren) will be able look at the art keenly until they can see it clearly in their minds' eye.

"No mere looking will fully unveil the inner meaning, we must learn the picture by heart, and hold it in our memory, that it may become a subject for contemplation and a joy;" Ms. Frost, PNEU, For the Children's Sake

2. Ask the children to study the picture closely for 2-3 minutes. Try not to give them any further directions. Answer questions about the artist or the context of the artist life let the child or children take an interest in the picture. If required add vague instructions like 'start with the big picture (form) and work your way into the tiny details.' 'It is quite plain that the most important reason for our study of pictures is to see the beauty and to learn the truth told in a different way by every age and school of painting." Miss Mason

- 3. **Turn the picture** over (hide from view) and ask the child (ren) to describe what they saw. Again ,if they struggle to organise their thoughts, you could give tips like 'start with the form and work your way into the tiny details'. Keep instructions to a minimum. "By carefully training the child's observation he will learn much about the value of colour and the beauty of composition at an early age which will be of infinite help to him later on." Miss. Evans,
- 4. **Repeat the process** and ask them to look at the picture again. Then hide the picture and ask them to describe what they saw. You will notice that this time they added more details. Resist the urge to probe, direct their attention or add to their details.







ABOUT OUR GUIDE TO MUSIC STUDY

Introduction

Music appreciation gives parents the opportunity to expose their children to the beauty, form and composition of wholesome music at home. For Charlotte Mason, music study was more effective when children were exposed to a stream of work of one composer at a time so they can become more familiar with the style, lessons and form of the artist's work.

"Let the young people hear good music as often as possible, and that under instruction.

It is a pity we like our music, as our pictures and our poetry, mixed, so that there are few opportunities of going through, as a listener, a course of the works of a single composer. But this is to be aimed at for the young people; let them study occasionally the works of a single great master until they have received some of his teaching and know his style" ~Charlotte Mason (Vol. 5, p. 235).

Our diverse and expanded approach to Music Study

Whilst we see tremendous value in Ms `Mason's recommendation of studying one omposer at a time, we also recognise need to expand the range of musicians and composers canonised within traditional Charlotte Mason music study programmes.

We have therefore included a wider range music and composers to ensure all children have an inclusive idea of what is considered "good music". It is imperative for children from black and non-European backgrounds to have the privilege of studying and valuing wholesome music from their own cultural heritage. In alignment with the guidance of Mrs E Glover who pioneered of the PNEU music study method, as she puts here:

"Do not imagine that you must play down to your little child; as in everything else, give him the very best from the commencement, though you may do well to select simple and melodious compositions with well-marked rhythms. Let your répertoire take a wide range, embracing operas and oratorios, as well as pieces specially written for the piano. (p. 579)

What is in the pack?

Each term, we will offer your family the option of studying two musicians, one of western musical tradition and the other an equally celebrated black or non-white heritage artist. How you choose to explore these musicians in your home is up to you. We recommend limiting the variety of songs and learning activities that pre-schoolers are exposed to at a time, so as not to overwhelm them.
